It was a very succesfull summer and we had visitors from all over the UK and from 19 other countries!







Colliad y HOPE

Yn ddiweddar derbyniodd yr amgueddfa gopiau o ddogfennau gan deulu lleol yn gynnwys rhai sy'n ymwneud â William David Rees a anwyd ym 1859 yn Aberystwyth, a fu farw 1919 yn 5 Stryd y Capel., Porthmadog. Goroedd William suddo'r barc HOPE yn ystod corwynt ym mis Awst 1892.

Roedd y HOPE yn barc pren a adeiladwyd yn Quebec ym 1865. Cafodd ei gofrestru yn Aberystwyth ac roedd yn eiddo i John Evans o'r porthladd hwnnw. Roedd hi'n galw yn rheolaidd ym Mhorthmadog, gan ddod â phren o Ogled America. Mae llwythi pren yn ysgafn iawn felly byddai'r howld yn llawn a'r llwyth wedi'i bentyr uchel ar y dec. Y drefn arferol oedd i gadwyni gael eu clymu o amgylch y llong ei hun a'r cargo. Hwn oedd achos ei cholled.

Pan hwyliau o Nash Creek New Brunswick i Borthmadog ar 22 Awst, cyfarfodd y llong storm ofnadwy i'r de o Cape Race a ddaeth hi ar ei "beam ends". Ceisiodd y criw rhyddhau'r cargo ar y dec ond troiodd y llong drosodd. Lwyddodd y criw i afael ar waelod y llong, ond dim ond ychydig amser y gallant glynw wrthi. Lwyddasant i afael ar rhai planciau rhydd oedd yn nofio ger y llong. Yn raddol, ildiodd y dynion i wylltineb y tonnau a'r oerni hyd nes mai dim ond tri oedd ar ôl. Fe wnaethon nhw lwyddo i wneud rafft ac ar ôl pedwar diwrnod, fe'u hachubwyd gan y sgwner AMELIA C. ac fe'u glaniasant nhw yn Halifax, Nova Scotia ar 15 Medi. Roedd dioddefaint y dynion tra oedd ar y rafft yn ddwys, ac roedd rhaid torri darnau o'u sea-boots iddynt gael eu cnoi i liniaru peth ar eu poenau.





Loss of the HOPE

The museum recently received copies of documents from a local family including those relating to William David Rees born 1859 in Aberystwyth, died 1919 at 5 Chapel St., Porthmadog. William survived the foundering of the barque HOPE during a hurricane in August 1892

The Hope was a wooden barque built in Quebec in 1865. She was registered in Aberystwyth and owned by John Evans of that port. She was a regular caller at Porthmadog, bringing timber from North America. Timber cargoes are very light so the hold would be full and the load piled high on the deck. The usual practice was for chains to be fastened right around the hull and the cargo. This was to be the cause of her loss.

When bound from Nash Creek New Brunswick to Porthmadog on 22nd August she encountered a violent gale to the south of Cape Race during which she went on her beam ends. Whilst the crew were attempting to cut loose her deck cargo she turned over. The crew managed to scramble upon the bottom of the upturned ship, but they were only able to cling to her for a short time. They succeeded in getting on some loose planks floating near the vessel. Gradually the men succumbed to the fury of the waves and exposure until finally only three were left. They managed to make a raft and after floating for four days they were picked up by the fishing schooner Amelia C. and landed at Halifax, Nova Scotia on 15 Sept.

The sufferings of the men whilst on the raft were intense, and they cut up a sea-boot and chewed the pieces to keep their tongues moist.

The six men who drowned were Captain David Jenkins, of Aberystwyth, Mate David Griffiths, of Aberystwyth, Cook Richard Edwards, of Aberystwyth, seaman Humphrey Jones, of Llanbedrog, seaman Robert Hughes, of Porthmadog and Boy James E. James, of Pwlheli. Those who survived were Boatswain William Rees, of Porthmadog, Arthur Frank Jolliffe from the Isle of Wight and John Nicholls from Fishguard.

These family papers deserve more research and a more detailed article compiled.


SHARP WORK.—On Friday morning, at half-past twelve, Mr Supt. Davies, Portmadoc, received information that property belonging to a seaman named Robert Evans, mate of a schooner now lying on the ballast bank, had been stolen; a description was given of the supposed thief, who was believed to be a seaman discharged by the mate on the previous day. The superintendent at once made inquiries at the station, and found that a man had booked to Afonwen, answering to the description. At Afon Wen it was ascertained that he had re-booked to Liverpool, whereupon a telegram was despatched to Chief-supt. Williams, Liverpool, and at 3.26 an answer was received that the man had arrived and been captured with the stolen property in his possession. This is remarkably sharp work—the information was received at Portmadoc at 12.30, and by 3.15 the man was in custody at Liverpool.
